## 國立臺灣師範大學校學士學位設置準則

### Guidelines for the Establishment of The University Interdisciplinary Bachelor Program

Approved on October 30, 2024

1. These Guidelines for the Establishment of the University Interdisciplinary Bachelor Program at National Taiwan Normal University (hereinafter referred to as "NTNU") are established to assist students in developing their abilities, cultivating creativity, enhancing interdisciplinary problem-solving skills, and fostering talents capable of integrating industry practices.
2. The University Interdisciplinary Bachelor Program (UIBP) referred to in these Guidelines is a bachelor's degree conferred by NTNU upon students who have completed the prescribed courses and credit requirements. Regulations pertaining to the completion of UIBP degree requirements shall be enacted separately.
3. Students applying to UIBP shall submit a Project Proposal to the review panel of Common Core Education Committee. The Proposal shall include the following components:
  - (1) Learning Background and Motivation: An analysis of social development trends, state of the industry concerned, and the student's personal career plans.
  - (2) Learning Objectives: Clearly defined objectives based on the aforementioned analysis.
  - (3) Curriculum Plan: A plan incorporating at least four complete Interdisciplinary Programs that are not confined to a single college, or a combination of any department's minor courses and two complete Interdisciplinary Programs that are not confined to a single college. In addition, the curriculum shall include internships, practical courses, or project-based courses designed to address potential interdisciplinary issues (at least two courses).

The review panel shall be convened by the Executive Secretary of Common Core Education Committee and composed of no fewer than three faculty members or industry experts from relevant fields. The panel shall review the student's Project Proposal, evaluate the proposed courses and credits, and determine the official title of the UIBP degree to be conferred.

4. Undergraduate students of NTNU (excluding those who have extended their study period) may apply to pursue a UIBP degree based on individual academic needs and interests. Upon approval, the degree may be pursued in the format of a double major. Furthermore, the number of Interdisciplinary Programs registered during their study, as specified in the curriculum plan under Article 3, shall be exempt from the limitations stipulated in NTNU's credit program regulations.
5. The number of students admitted to pursue a UIBP degree each academic year shall not exceed 5% of the NTNU's second-year undergraduate student population.

6. The graduation qualifications of students pursuing a UIBP degree shall be reviewed by the Common Core Education Committee review panel and submitted to the Office of Academic Affairs for final approval and the issuance of the degree certificate.
7. If these Guidelines are to be discontinued, a written explanation shall be published at least one academic year prior to the effective date of termination. The explanation shall include counseling procedures for students who have already obtained eligibility for UIBP. Termination of these Guidelines shall take effect only upon approval by the Academic Affairs Meeting and subsequent public announcement.
8. Matters not stipulated in the Guidelines shall be handled in accordance with the University's Academic Regulations and relevant rules and regulations.
9. These Guidelines and any amendment thereto shall be implemented upon passage by the Academic Affairs Council and submission to the Ministry of Education for record.
